STEM pupils awarded trophy in robotics competition... FIRST Tech Challenge



Congratulations to **Kayla**, **Bethanie**, **Finn** and **Tejas** from Year 7 and **Sky**, **Kai**, **Ariyan** and **Jake** in Year 9 for returning with a trophy and a place in the UK Championships from the 'More than Robots FIRST Tech Challenge' event in Bristol on 29 January.

The team - the Six Villages Cyborgs - were presented with the 'Motivate' award by the judges who said, "This team showed great team spirit and enthusiasm. They demonstrated resilience and learnt the importance of

Finn said, "We had to problem-solve on the day, when we realised the floor was more spongy than we had thought it would be and our robot didn't move as well. We solved this by quickly adding extra wheels, doubling them up to change the tyre pressure and make the robot move better. We also had to reprogramme the claws to make them move in a different direction."




Science teacher Miss Clements, who runs the weekly STEM enrichment session, said, "I'm so proud of the team and what they have achieved in their first term of our Robotics club. Entering this year's FIRST Tech Challenge UK was a brilliant chance to inspire our pupils by providing opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) and gave the team a goal to aim for in their weekly sessions.

Their mission was to build and code a robot and compete against teams of 11-18 year olds from

schools across the country at the regional tournament in Bristol. The pupils spent the term getting to know the kit that we were provided with, as well as the coding program, then building the robot and finally programming it to make it do what they've told it to. It has been hard, has tested their engineering and team working skills but has been really fun! They held their own against teams of older pupils, coming fifth overall and winning themselves a place at the UK Championships in London."

We can't share any of the images until judging has taken place, but we will be showcasing them around the academy and in our next newsletter, after half term. All entries from the competition will also be on display at the Oxmarket Gallery in Chichester during the last 2 weeks in February.

- Expedition (completing a training and assessed 2-day hike with an overnight camp).




Dorset Sponsored Walk, 9-13 July 2020

Pupils visit Belgium & France WWI Battlefields Tour

On 9 February, Mr Rondel had the honour and privilege to take four pupils from the academy around the battlefields of Belgium and France on a 4-day residential visit, arranged by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Mr Rondel said, "Isobel, Millie, Lewis and Rhys have been a credit to the academy and have fully partaken in everything. I am so proud at the level of respect they showed throughout the week and hope they will have memories to last a lifetime."



Mr Rondel and the pupils recount their experience below:



"Arriving in Belgium on day one, we started at the Memorial Museum Passchendaele 1917 where we had a trenches experience, and saw the life of everyday people the war. The durina museum showed us the experience of the home front both in Europe and the UK. Here we

experienced a replica trench and learnt about trench warfare and the start of the war. Following on from this we went to the Lijssenthoek Cemetery and got an understanding of the huge effort of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Lijssenthoek was a Casualty Clearing Station, and the pupils had a chance to apply and see what they have done in GCSE History in person. I also got a



chance to honour a family member who fell during the war.

After here we went to the Langemark Cemetery, a German cemetery. Here we learnt how other



European countries pay their respect to their war us showed us the different kit they carry with them on dead.

Finally we went to the Tyne Cot Military Cemetery, where we paid tribute to a soldier local to us at the On our final day we saw how the war changed, and academy. Pupils here saw the number of unknown the final steps to victory for Britain and the graves and got an understanding of the scale of the Commonwealth. We started the day at the site of the loss. In the evening we took part in the Menin Gate Battle of Le Hamel, the part of the war that lead to ceremony in Ypres, paying our respects whilst success. Following on from here we went to the looking at the names of those without graves. This place where the armistice was signed on 11th 1920s—the evening we were there was the 31,677th site as it is also where Hitler made France surrender, time this historical event has taken place.



On our second day we focused on the events of the Battle of the Somme. We went to a number of different sites of the battle and learnt about how the battle developed and how the British lost and won in different areas. On our trip we had 3 active service people with us, and at the different battle sites they gave us an insight into how things are done differently in the modern day. Finally, we went to the Theipval Memorial where we paid respect to another local solider who fought in the battle, but does not have a grave. In the evening, the service people with

Harley takes 1st place in Ten Pin Bowling tournament

Keen ten pin bowler **Harley** is flying high after competing in his latest tournament.

Harley, who is in Year 7, took part in the Junior category of the annual South of England Youth Open ten pin bowling tournament in Dunstable.

He competed in the Junior Boys category held over the weekend of 11 & 12 January, bowling 9 straight games, but had to wait until the following weekend to see if he was in the running for a trophy.

It was worth the tense wait to travel back to Dunstable with his family as he won an astonishing three first place trophies!



Harley took 1st place scratch in singles (521 series over 3 games) as well as 1st place scratch in doubles (another 521 series over 3 games).

He then went on to beat 19 other boys in his category to take the coveted 1st place scratch 'all events' with an astonishing total of 1442 over his 9 games played. His average of 160 over the 9 games was also a personal best for him at a tournament.

He also bowled a new high game personal best of 232 and a high series personal best of 584, gaining 3 badges in recognition of this incredible set of scores for his age group.

Harley became fascinated by the game as a toddler after receiving a miniature tabletop version as a present. Going to a real bowling alley cemented his obsession and he quickly adopted the 'granny' style of bowling, rolling the ball from between his legs, rather than using a ramp or having the gutters up, and having surprisingly accurate aim for his age! His passion was obvious and his local club were persuaded to let him join even though he was below their minimum age of 6. In his first competition when



he was just 5, he was the youngest to compete by several years and amazingly wasn't last! Harley's stepfather is his coach and last year they won a doubles adult league; Harley was the only junior player to be competing.

Harley said, *"I bowl in the adult league once a week, and the youth league on a Saturday. I bowl 9 games a week and enter competitions when I can.*

I have always enjoyed bowling, whenever I win awards it motivates me. Getting a spare or a strike always gives my heart a boost!

I am trying out for the county squad at the end of the month and my aim is to eventually join Team England's youth squad."
