In an update from a previous newsletter there is more swimming success to be celebrated for Katie O, now in year 10. Over the summer Katie spent the first 2 weeks in Sheffield competing in the British Swimming Championships and the National Swimming Championships.

Katie spent her time racing against the fastest swimmers in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland in her age group. This culminated in Katie becoming the fastest 14-year-old female in 50m Freestyle in England.

This has resulted in Katie being selected for the Commonwealth GB pathway, where she will have access to Team GB coaches, online learning, advice and training sessions. What a fantastic opportunity for this budding swimming superstar!

Katie has also earned a place to compete on a County level after being selected to represent Sussex at Inter County competitions.
