

Political Manipulation in the Media

'It doesn't affect me.'

A statement often used regarding politics. At its core, it is a dismissal. Nothing more, nothing less. They believe that the limitation and withdrawal of human rights will not affect them. However, neutrality can and will prove to be the death of justice, due to a lack of information, education, and empathy.

The growth in the consumption of media is astronomical. It is no longer confined to books, cinema, and television. Digital media has demonstrated itself to be the most practical route for information. With news outlets, websites, social media apps, and multiple search engines, information and entertainment are easily attainable. One specific way these two can co-exist is within political media sources.

However, the primary function of media is to make profit. By creating enjoyable and entertaining political content, they can profit off people's desire to educate themselves, whilst not boring themselves. This has become a difficult situation as the media is prioritising the entertaining content rather than the informative content as it has larger interaction, specifically from younger audiences. As a result of this, false narratives and exaggerated headlines are



advertised more than the complicated truth, because they are easier to understand, less time consuming, and more fun to engage with.

Creating short but entertaining content has shortened the attention span of millions of people, and additionally their consideration for important political subjects, as they are not thinking as thoroughly as they should be. Consuming media in mass amounts has its consequences. An apathy to violence as a result of over-exposure to it is one major result. With the collaboration of informative and entertaining content, specifically used for news coverage, we become desensitised to conflicts and injustices around the world. This is because of the short attention span we've adapted to. We view a video; we scroll onto the next one. The average person views a video for approximately 3 seconds before scrolling and the adult attention span has decreased to 8.25 seconds on average.

This contributes to a lack of empathy within media, as we begin to view the coverage of these conflicts as entertainment sources, rather than information sources. Therefore, we do not fully see the people affected by this as actual people, but rather as statistics (as they are often portrayed by news outlets as such.)

This negatively affects how people view political parties, as they see their hate speech as comedic or satirical, and become accustomed to their beliefs because they make for useful sources of entertainment, mainly due to shock factor. These younger audiences are prioritising their need for entertainment rather than their thirst for knowledge, which is withering away.

These political parties, fuelled by extremism, capitalise on our engagement with the media to specifically craft their campaigns to cater to our media consumption. By creating entertaining content, often almost satirical and in mockery of their opposition, it appeals to their demographic of young, influential, actively online audiences, seeking humour because we have grown so desensitised to suffering. We are the generation of technological development, and we are the future. These parties know this. They actively use it to encourage their ideology, and because we have grown to trust media information, we do not bother to ensure their agenda is right. We have grown to trust the internet so much that we blindly believe what these political parties are promising.

Do you realise how damaging that is?

What can we do? Taking the initiative and researching for yourself is one of the most beneficial things you can do when it comes to educating yourself. Not caring about your future is not caring about anybody's future. A vote not used is a vote wasted. A vote against progress. Viewing extremists as comedic is directly giving them attention, and interaction with their content fuels their campaign. Take it seriously or do not take it at all.

Believing everything you see online directly contributes to a rise in fascism, as you are legitimatising their extremist views. You are giving them a platform to address people with. These social media pages you see for political candidates are simply propaganda. You are not immune to it.

You can easily be influenced by it. And you are.

4th January - World Braille Day



The Iliad by Homer





A GREEN career day was held for year 9 in November.


Students were able to explore career options including photography, artwork and book writing.
