Dear Parents and Carers

As usual on the last day of term, we held a whole academy assembly this morning in the sports hall. The Year 11 student leaders spoke passionately to students about their experiences at Six Villages during their years here and encouraged the younger years to grasp every opportunity open to them. I spoke to students about the 70 enrichment clubs on offer to students and I recognised the time and effort that staff put into the enriching activities they provide. We talked about the fun events taking place in the summer term including our inaugural Colour Run which will be held in June and the year group enrichment days planned which will include the climbing wall, laser tag and much more.

On a more serious note, I spoke to the student body about expectations for conduct in lessons. I reminded students of our mantra of 'think hard, work hard and take pride in your work'. I have been very clear that there is a zero tolerance to disruption of learning and I have set the target to students that no child should need to be removed from lesson next half term. If a child does not meet classroom expectations and needs to be removed, they will no longer go to Tier 1, they will go to an allocated classroom where they will sit in silence and complete their work.

We are determined that the educational experience of every child will be the best that it can be and will absolutely not tolerate any disruption to this.

Some of you may be aware that we have had supply teachers working in school this term. I would like to clarify, that these teachers, who are qualified and experienced teachers, follow the scheme of work that is required, their lessons are valuable and students are required to complete work set to the same high standard as for any other lesson. If your child is coming home and telling you that they don't do anything if they have a supply teacher, this is not true. Heads of Department set the work and monitor the work completed closely. All schools, at times, need to use supply teachers; they quickly become valued members of the teaching team and I expect every student to respect them and complete their work as usual.

ROAD CLOSURE: Lidsey Road (A29), Woodgate

No vehicles over the level crossing 12 April - 27 April

SGN will be carrying out essential gas main reinforcement on Lidsey Road (A29) between Hook Lane and Oak Tree Lane.

What this means:

 No through traffic - a signed diversion will be in place.
Resident access maintained - south of the

Resident access maintained - south of the level crossing via the south, north via the north.

No vehicles over the level crossing. Bus services affected - check with your provider.

provider. Bin collections remain the same unless advised otherwise.

Emergency services informed - access will be maintained.

Engineers will be working extended hours to complete the work as quickly as possible.

Immediate advice if you have concerns about a young person's firesetting behaviour:

- Consider your own actions and how they may influence the behaviour of the children you are responsible for.
- 2. Never leave matches or lighters around the home, even in pockets or handbags.
- 3. Never assume toddlers or infants are incapable of lighting a match or lighter.
- Be aware they may hide matches and/or lighters in their clothing, possessions or bedrooms for use later.
- Ensure that you have working smoke alarms on each floor and one in the bedroom of the young person.
- 6. Do not allow rubbish to pile up.
- 7. If you have an open fire make sure it is fitted with an adequate safety guard.



Why do young people play with fire?

Young people may play with fire for various reasons, for example, a natural curiosity or seeking attention. Without help and guidance, firesetting behaviour can escalate and lead to more serious consequences.

We can reduce the chances of young people starting fires by understanding and challenging their behaviour and by giving them some basic fire safety advice.

We can give guidance to parents, carers and professionals who may be concerned about a young person playing with fire.



This photograph shows an example of a trained 'Firewise' advisor working with a young child to discuss what is 'safe or unsafe' and the reasons they have for their decisions.

This activity allows the child to talk about experiences they have had with fire and for the advisor to educate about making safe choices.

Watch out for these tell-tale signs of firesetting behaviour:


- Matches or lighters hidden in bedrooms, school bags or coats.
- An unusual fascination with fire.
- Small burn holes on carpets, bedding and furniture.
- Scorch marks in hidden locations such as in wardrobes or cupboards.
- Burnt paper or objects in bins.
- Burnt matches lying around.
- Noticing the smell of burning.
- Unexplained fires in the home or garden.
- Noticing injuries to skin e.g. burns.



Our Firewise Scheme...

Aims to eliminate the likelihood of young people firesetting in the future, by educating them about the dangers and impacts of fire, enabling them to make safer choices.

Do you have concerns about a young person and fire?



All of our 'Firewise' advisors will provide information, support, advice and guidance to you and the young person.

Our advisors are available to visit schools, home or other establishments. Permission of parents/carers is required before any visit is undertaken.

Once a referral is received, an advisor will make contact to arrange a visit at a time and place convenient for you and the young person.

A menu of flexible and tailored activities, have been created to develop and enhance the young person's fire safety knowledge.

Through partnership working, we can liaise with organisations that assist the young people with other needs that they may have.
