Overall from the two days of events, a grand total of £670 was raised by students, parents, carers and staff in our comunity.



Our 'Wear it Red' activities raised money and demonstrated the 'fun' in fundraising, including having cold, wet sponges thrown at staff in the pillary!"







IT Manager, this is a role I wanted to do from a child because I enjoy IT and helping people.


2. What is the best thing about your job?



Hunger Games: Sunrise on the Reaping by Suzanne Collins






1984 is a well-known classic with a heavy focus on politics. It follows the story of a young man in a strict, dystopian society is which the government surveys the population at all times.

This tale was written as a word of caution and is a must read for anyone interested in the modern day or past political landscape.


